

Seminar Description:

Effective behavior management is a critical component of running a classroom. Research indicates that teachers and school staff sometimes utilize different discipline practices across racial groups. Unfortunately, inconsistent discipline practices can lead to students feeling disconnected from school, which in turn results in a range of negative academic and social outcomes. Teachers play a critical role in helping to ensure consistency in classroom management, discipline practices, and student well-being. This workshop will begin with an overview of the research on disproportionate discipline. Several research-based strategies for effective classroom management will be presented, with an emphasis on best practices for ensuring equitable treatment of students in the classroom. This workshop is designed for teachers, support staff, and administrators who are interested in research-based classroom strategies and making their classrooms a welcoming environment.

Outcome Objectives: Participants will gain knowledge and skills in:

- Understanding the discipline disproportionately gap
- Identifying three evidence-based strategies to manage behavior in the classroom
- Understanding how inequitable discipline occurs through vulnerable decision points
- Identifying strategies to reduce disproportionate discipline within the classroom

Seminar Description:

Today's educators are faced with increasingly greater challenges inside and outside the classroom. This includes oppositional and defiant behavior, aggression, depression, anxiety, ADHD symptoms, and other issues. Regardless of the educator's experience and training, students' unique difficulties may significantly disrupt classroom management, educational progress, and the classroom and/or school culture and climate. It is critical for successful programming to encompass multiple modalities of support to prevent and manage challenging behavior and improve one's emotional regulation. This includes emotional supports conveying a nonjudgmental, supportive, and values-driven approach; behavioral supports that are clear, consistent, and meaningful, yet also individualized for maximum efficacy; social skills programming that teaches and strengthens replacement behaviors and fosters generalization; and educational programming appropriate for each learner. Dr. Selbst will highlight these areas, allowing participants to turnkey critical components to prevent and manage challenging behavior, to preclude more restrictive programming when possible, and to promote collaboration within the school and between home and school.

Outcome Objectives: Participants will gain knowledge and skills in:

- Identifying at least 3 factors which contribute to emotional regulation impairment.
- De-escalating challenging behavior and increasing students' ability to express emotions and regulate their behavior.
- Generalizing behavior management skills across school situations and promoting student self-monitoring.

Been There, Done That...Now What??? Identifying Behavior Supports for Students Not Responding to Traditional Class Management Plans (Grades K-5)

Seminar Description:

While many times student misbehavior can be addressed through class-wide measures, such as establishing clear expectations, verbally praising students, and having consistent consequences for misbehavior, not all students respond to these strategies. Approximately 5-10% of students do not respond to traditional disciplinary interventions, leaving teachers at a loss for how to deal with their behavior (Maag, 2012). During this session participants will explore how to identify individualized strategies and supports for students not responding to traditional class behavior management plans. Examples of evidence-based class-wide behavioral support practices will also be shared for participants to evaluate their current classroom management plans. Participants will leave with access to example materials and other resources for developing and implementing behavior strategies with their students.

Outcome Objectives: Participants will gain knowledge and skills in:

- Assessing the efficacy of their current class-wide, universal behavior management strategies in order to determine if adjustments are needed for all students in the class.
- Identifying preventative strategies and modifications to the environment to address specific triggers for individual students' misbehaviors.
- Exploring examples of replacement skills and strategies to teach students to use to "replace" the problem behaviors.

Play is the natural language of the child. It is a developmentally appropriate way to engage with, and to understand children. Attempting to work with students on their emotional and behavioral issues verbally can be difficult for the student and the school staff. Play therapy is recognized as an effective means of addressing many developmental and psychological issues of children and adolescents. In this workshop, participants will learn about types of play therapy that are suitable for use with students of Pre-K and early elementary grades in the school setting.
